Practical Tips

Teachers' previous jobs display

Job shadowing days

Implementation: Arrange for pupils to spend a day shadowing different staff members, including teachers, administrative staff, and the facilities team. Ensure pupils have a chance to ask questions and participate in daily tasks.

Student-Led Projects
